

Animal Medicine Record

Keep a medicines book that answers the two questions that actually get asked: what went into which animals, and when they are clear.

What was given, to which animals, by whom, and the date the withdrawal period ends — copied from the label, not from us.

EVERY FIGURE ON THIS SHEET COMES FROM THE LABEL

No medicine, no dose, no route and no withdrawal period is printed on this sheet, and none ever will be. Those come from the product label and your vet, they differ between products and countries, and a wrong one on a page like this could put meat or milk into the food chain. Copy them from the label every time.

HOW TO USE THIS SHEET

- 1
- Write the withdrawal period exactly as the label states it, then work out the date it ends and write that too — the date is what anyone reading this in a hurry actually needs.
- 2
- Record the batch number and expiry. If there is ever a recall, this column is the whole point of keeping the record.
- 3
- Identify the animals treated well enough that somebody else could pick them out.
- 4
- Keeping medicine records is a legal requirement in many countries, often on a specified form and for a specified number of years. Check what applies to you.
